

Watsonville Hours


PREVIOUS EXCHANGE HOURS



- Watsonville hours expanding from 5 per week to 7 per week
- Starting on Friday June 17th we will have a 9am-1lam shift
- Brings equity of service days to the Watsonville exchange
- Feedback from participants and potential participants during outreach contributed to our decision on the day and time of day to add hours

New Kiosk Installation

- Worked with the City of Watsonville to designate a location
- New Syringe Disposal Kiosk was installed 06/03/2022
- Watsonville Waste and Recycling Drop off Center located at 320 Harvest Dr., Watsonville, CA 95076
- Days and hours of access are Tuesday-Saturday from 9am-2:30pm
- Total of 7 Kiosks now installed (5 in Santa Cruz and 2 in Watsonville)




Starting in July 2022, SSP Reports will note that All participants are offered education on several topics

- 1) Syringe Disposal
- 2) Overdose Prevention
- 3) Drug Treatment
- 4) HIV/Hep C testing and treatment
- 5) Harm Reduction

June 28th County BOS Meeting

Background:

On February 15, 2022, the Board directed HSA to return on or before June 28, 2022 "with a plan to address previous direction provided on June 8, 2021, to use our existing solid waste resources to come up with a systemic response to syringe collection, by either expanding contracts with current providers and/or releasing an RFP (Request for Proposal) or RFQ (Request for Quotation to solicit such services, including a potential on-demand response component."



On June 28th, HAS plans to report back on the following

- 1) Review of County efforts to address syringe litter control
- 2) No RFP was released (not a specific board directive) However the County has expanded syringe litter control activities over the past year, including:
- Leveraging existing solid waste resources
- Kiosk expansion
- Personal sharps container distribution
- Large syringe disposal boxes
- Centralized syringe litter reporting app (My Santa Cruz County)
- Convenings with other jurisdictions
- Outreach/education
- 3) HSA currently spends about 30% of the program budget on syringe litter activities but does not have a specific funding source for syringe collection. County DPW provides services only in the unincorporated areas, hence the importance of partnership with all jurisdictions
