On April 25, 2023, the HSA SSP program presented its <u>Biennial Report</u> to the County Board of Supervisors which included a recommendation from the SSP Advisory Commission to adopt a hybrid model pilot that increased participant access to exchange services by replacing a shift at the Emeline and Watsonville fixed-site locations with a mobile exchange shift.

This report provides an update of the first five months of implementation (Aug. 2023-Jan. 2024) of the SSP Hybrid Model Pilot in both Santa Cruz and Watsonville.



### **Exchange Models: Watsonville vs. Santa Cruz** SSP staff co-located with HPHP Street Medicine Staff at both locations

### Watsonville Mobile Exchange

- Staff conducted supply distribution and syringe collection with a dedicated table at an established outreach location.
- Representatives from other agencies such as Salvation Army, Salud Para La Gente, and Community Action Board maintained a regular presence.

### Santa Cruz Mobile Exchange

Staff used a wagon and backpack for supply distribution and syringe collection.

- **Conducted in multiple locations with a split 2-hour shift:** Coral St./Limekiln St. and River Walk between Water St. and Soquel Ave. bridges on the west/downtown side of the San Lorenzo River.
- Emails sent to City of Santa Cruz Staff: Tuesday for planned Mobile site locations before each shift and Thursday for activity updates after each shift.

## **Pilot Program Achievements**

- Mobile exchanges allow staff to meet participants where they are and connect them to critical treatment and care for HIV and other infectious diseases.
- Co-locating with MAT providers and Medical Assistants improves immediate linkages for participants to schedule treatment appointments at County Health Centers and Janus.
- Supply distribution helped build rapport between staff and the unhoused community, allowing staff to share additional community resources and harm reduction education activities.

# **Syringe Litter Reduction**

165 pounds of syringe waste were collected by the kiosk near Kaiser Arena on the River Walk path collected from August 2023 to January 2024



Downtown Streets Team reported a continued decline in total syringe litter collection numbers for City of Santa Cruz Routes. They collect syringe litter along 6 routes.

Syringe litter collection data for the Watsonville area is currently unavailable.
